
Selby graduated from Royal Roads Military College, following in the footsteps of his father who attended military college in Kingston. Selby's grandfather also served in the airforce for several years.

After his graduation, Selby rose through the ranks to fly the CF-18 Hornet out of the Canadian Forces 441 Tactical Fighter Squadron base in Cold Lake, Alberta.

He flew with NATO forces in Kosovo as part of the Canadian contingent based in Aviano, Italy.

When he joined the Snowbirds, Selby was

"Last spring we went to Comox to watch manoeuvres. I've seen many airshows and you have to be afraid for the young people flying, but when it's your own grandson it's terrifying," said Kyle.

His grandmother told the young pilot that she prayed for him every night, but she said he was very nonchalant about it. "To him, it was like breathing."

A funeral with full military honours will be held today in Moose Jaw where Selby's wife Julie resides. A family service will be held in Tsawwassen, where
